

Dear Members of Pastoral Area 14

One of the most visible changes that took place in the Catholic Church in the aftermath of the Second Vatican Council in the late 1960s was Mass being celebrated in different languages, in our case in English. After having become accustomed to centuries of Mass in Latin some people were dismayed that change could take place in the Church! Realists, however, recognised that the nearly two thousand years of the Church's history have been centuries of constant change, according to the situations in which Christians found themselves. Today, change is a part of life and people soon tire of the familiar and well-tried! No point in sitting back and criticising others. Technology has advanced beyond peoples' wildest dreams. We live in a different way from 60 years ago. Cultural norms have all but disintegrated and the face of religious belief is no longer expressed as it was. But what a challenge!

It is no surprise, therefore, that our own archdiocese is engaged in adapting to the world in which we find ourselves, as the second decade of this millennium draws to a close. In 2020 the Archdiocese of Liverpool will be holding a Synod, a gathering of representatives from all parts of the archdiocese with our archbishop. I presume that we shall be taking into account the decline in numbers of Catholics who regularly go to Mass and the comparable decline in the number of priests and members of Religious Orders and Communities in the Church of Liverpool. What an opportunity! We are all involved! Over these next two years there will be much discussion and sharing of ideas. All are invited to help in what is really an exciting venture, namely, that of discerning how we can become followers of Jesus Christ in a different and more committed way and so carry out our Christian responsibilities.

Between now and the Eucharistic Congress taking place in Liverpool in September we are asked to make these months a time of personal renewal and special prayer for the success of the Synod. The congress' focal point is Christ's presence in the Eucharist and the centrality of the Mass in our lives. I encourage you to take what steps you can to enter more deeply into the great mystery of the Mass and so discern why we Catholics regard the Mass as the central act of our Christian faith. Holy Hours are also being celebrated around the archdiocese and Archbishop Malcolm will preside at our Pastoral Area's Holy Hour on **Tuesday 29 May** in St Anne's Church, Ormskirk, at 7.30pm.

In these coming months may we all experience the joy of the Risen Christ as our ancestors in faith have celebrated - for 2000 years.

Ashes for mourning

When I was a child I very devoutly would go to Church and receive the Ashes at the beginning of Lent. I certainly didn't have any idea of what the ashes I received really meant. However, there was a drawing within to this ritual that somehow went beyond a rational explanation. Years later I used to stand as a Parish Priest and wonder what was it that brought people each Ash Wednesday, for some, the only time in the year that they walked through the doors of the Church.

Ronald Rolheiser says

'Their popularity, I suspect, comes from the fact that, as a symbol, they are blunt, primal, archetypal, and speak the language of the soul. Something inside each of us knows exactly why we take the ashes: "Dust thou art and into dust thou shalt return!"

I guess we wear the ashes to remind us that and others that, for a period of time, 40 days we are going to be reflective, challenging ourselves to change, not avoiding the difficult demands of the Gospel. It's to say for the period of Lent that you are willing to face some of the things you have done. It's a reminder too, that God is at work silently inside us, and that you are ready to let that which is dead within, the dross that so often fills us, be healed and transformed so that we might experience a deep inner freedom.

Lent is a season for each of us, not just to wear ashes for one day and then wash their meaning off along with the morning shower but in many senses as Rolheiser says 'to sit in the ashes', refusing to live as we usually do with our ego needs being at the fore of our lives, waiting while some silent growth takes place within us, and simply being still so that God can work in us and so that we experience some sort of resurrection at the end of forty days

Reaching Out.

On 4th September 1887, a new Parish dedicated to St. George, Patron Saint of England, was founded in Maghull. Its boundaries were set before even one brick was laid to build a church. Rather than being confined to Maghull the boundaries had an outreach which embraced Melling and Kirkby. This initiative led to further provision of Catholic Education to communities which, all those years ago, were in an even poorer state than Maghull.

In his capacity as Bishop's Secretary, Father Charles Green, a man of vision, who became St. George's first Parish Priest, officially defined the New Mission's boundaries in his own handwriting "**Starting at the Maghull Brook (which separates the townships of Lydiate & Maghull) follow the boundary line between the township of Maghull on the one side and the township of Sefton and Netherton on the other side, till it joins the River Alt at the highroad, then follow the Alt till it passes under the Canal to the East of the Bull Bridge near Aintree and to the Railway, then along the Railway (Liverpool & Wigan Rlwy) W.Kirkby Station, Along Melling Road-Back Lane-Cunscough Lane to nearly opposite "Rawlinson's" Farm, across by the hedge to Giddigate Lane, along Giddigate Lane-Park Lane & Kenyon's Lane to Boundary Stone, then follow Boundary line between Maghull & Lydiate & Maghull Brook to the Alt.**

The boundaries were agreed on by the Missionaries concerned and sanctioned by the Bishop in March 1888.

"It was a great success, and everyone was so generous. I raised almost £100, which my Grandparents topped up to the round £100 – in return for a cake."

What is World Meeting of Families 2018?



Dublin, Ireland, has been chosen by Pope Francis to host the next World Meeting of Families from 21-26 August 2018, guided by the theme "The Gospel of the Family: Joy for the World".

Held every three years, this major international event brings together families from across the world to celebrate, pray and reflect upon the central importance of marriage and the family as the cornerstone of our lives, of society and of the Church. The event has at its heart the following key moments:

21 August 2018, a National Opening of WMOF2018, which will take place simultaneously in all the different dioceses of Ireland.

22 to the 24 August 2018, a three-day Congress. Each day will reflect on the theme "The Gospel of the Family: Joy for the World" chosen by the Holy Father and will include an enriching programme for adults of keynote speakers, workshops, talks, testimonies and discussions; an engaging and exciting programme for young people as well as fun activities for children. The Congress will also include daily celebration of the Eucharist, prayerful activities, exhibitions, cultural events and musical performances.

Saturday 25 August 2018, a Festival of Families, comprising a reflective concert style event within a prayerful and joyful atmosphere, in which personal stories of faith will be shared by families from all continents.

Sunday 26 August 2018, WMOF2018 will close with a solemn Eucharistic Celebration, that will gather thousands of people from Ireland and all over the world.

NEW HEADTEACHER AT ST ANNE'S CATHOLIC PRIMARY SCHOOL, ORMSKIRK.

Mr Philip Bates took up his position as Headteacher at St Anne's Catholic Primary School at the beginning of November 2017.

Prior to joining St Anne's, Philip had been Headteacher at St Gregory's Catholic Primary School in Preston for six years. During that time, St Gregory's was identified as an outstanding school by both Ofsted and the Diocese of Lancaster. The school leadership team was also described as "outstanding". Philip has settled in very well at St Anne's. He maintains that he was really impressed by the friendliness and dedication of the staff and the enthusiasm and excellent behaviour of the pupils when he visited the school prior to his interview. Since November, he has come to recognise that his initial reaction was well founded. He speaks proudly about the commitment and professionalism of the staff as indicated by the standards achieved by the pupils. In addition, the staff offer numerous additional opportunities for the pupils including dinnertime and after school clubs which promote the school's commitment to a broad and balanced curriculum. Music and the arts play an increasingly significant part in school life with over twenty children receiving specialist music tuition and over thirty children singing in our school choir. Recent successes achieved by the pupils include the Year 3, Year 4, Year 5 and Year 6 athletics teams winning their school cluster games competition. It is obvious that the children are happy and enjoy coming to school. Philip is in the playground each morning to meet them and to be available to greet and speak to parents.

There have been a number of significant developments since November. Both Year 6 classrooms have been refurbished and work is about to begin on developing a brand new learning zone which will incorporate a computing room and library.



When asked about his vision for the future of St Anne's, Philip emphasised that he wanted St Anne's to be recognised as a high achieving, happy and welcoming school which fully implemented the school motto "Loving God In All We Do".

He is already looking forward to the new Reception intake in September as they will be the first Year Group which he will welcome as new members of the school. Philip stresses that current and prospective parents are always welcome to contact him and visit the school.

Philip is a family man. He is married to Helen and they have four children, Joseph aged 14, Charlotte aged 11, Thomas aged 10 and Sam aged 7. All attend Catholic schools in the Preston area. Philip

has a number of interests including spending quality time with his family, walking in the Lake District and rock climbing. He enjoys watching his children play tennis and organising days out with his extended family.

Philip emphasises that he feels honoured to be the new Headteacher of St Anne's and he is looking forward to leading the school to further success in the years ahead.

Our Lady Untier of Knots

In 1986 Fr. Jorge Mario Bergoglio (better known as Pope Francis) was in Augsburg, Germany to complete a thesis he was writing. In the church of Sankt Peter am Perlach he saw a 17th century painting of "Our Lady Untier of Knots", which had a profound and long lasting effect on him. The knots represented the troubles of life, especially family life, which Our Lady was seen untying for us, to enable us to move closer to her Son. In a homily on 8 December 2011 the then Cardinal Bergoglio explained -:
"We all have knots, or deficiencies in our hearts, and we go through difficulties. God, our good Father, who distributes His grace to all of His children, wants us to trust her [Mary], to entrust to her the knots of our sins, the tangles of our miseries that prevent us from uniting ourselves with God, to allow her to untie them and bring us back to her son Jesus"

Pope Francis' prayer to Our Lady Untier of Knots

Holy Mary, full of God's presence during the days of your life, you accepted with full humility the Father's will and the Devil was never capable of distracting you with his confusion.

Once with your Son you interceded for our difficulties, and full of kindness and patience you gave us an example of how to untie the knots of our life.

By remaining forever our Mother, you make it more clear how to put in order the ties that link us to the Lord.



Mother of Mercy, Pray for us!

Holy Mary, Mother of God and our Mother, to you, who untie with motherly love the knots of our life, we pray to you to receive into your hands (person's name), and to free him/her of the knots and confusion with which the enemy attacks him/her.
